

#### On the first day of Christmas my "true love" gave to me

(but are they really your "true love" when they give you all these dangerous gifts??)

- TINSEL and other hanging decorations can look just like cat toys. There is a risk that your pet might swallow them or
  even break glass ornaments causing injury. Tinsel in particular can cause serious illness if ingested due to the
  blockages it can cause, in some cases this can even be fatal.
- 2. CHRISTMAS PUDDING and mince pies grapes and dried vine fruits, including currants, sultanas and raisins can cause severe kidney failure if eaten
- Chocolate and sweets chocolate is toxic to dogs and even small amounts can cause serious illness. Many Christmas sweets such as candy canes contain a sugar-free sweetener called xylitol, which is poisonous to dogs.
- Onions, garlic, leeks, shallots and chives all belong to the allium species of plant and are poisonous to dogs whether
  cooked or uncooked. Avoid feeding foods that include these ingredients, such as gravy.
- Leftovers Don't be tempted to give your dog leftover Christmas food which can include hidden ingredients toxic to dogs. Also mould in leftovers can make them ill.
- Christmas trees—the oils produced by some real Christmas trees are also mildly toxic if consumed, causing minor
  irritation to a pet's mouth and stomach.
- 7. Christmas lights can pose a real danger to pets if they decide to chew on any electrical wiring. Switch lights off at the mains when you're not around to supervise your pet, use battery powered LED lights instead. If you do use electric lights be sure to cover any exposed wires leading to the tree with plastic or cardboard tubes.
- 8. Christmas plants
  - Poinsettia is often feared by cat owners but is, in fact, only mildly toxic to felines if eaten causing minor stomach irritation
  - Berries, including those from holly and mistletoe, are far more dangerous, as well as amaryllis plants
  - Dieffenbachia, causes irritation of the mouth and can be toxic.
- Alcohol- Dogs cannot metabolize alcohol, so drinks, foods, or household products containing alcohol can cause lethargy, respiratory depression and dangerously low body temperature in dogs.
- 10. Snow globes Cat owners should be wary of snow globes as they can contain ethylene glycol, commonly known as antifreeze. This is highly toxic to pets. If the ornament breaks and the liquid spills out, there's a real risk your cat could lick it up or swallow it whilst grooming and become critically ill. Be sure to check what chemicals your snow globe contains and keep it well out of the reach of any curious cat!
- Cheese board Keep your pet away from blue cheeses such as stilton. The fungus used to make these cheeses
  produces a substance called roquefortine C which dogs can be sensitive to. This substance can cause vomiting,
  diarrhoea, high temperatures and even seizures.
- 12. STRESS at Christmas! Too many guests can be stressful for your pet. Prepare by providing a safe space for them to retreat. This could be a quiet room or a den, make sure it's somewhere where they can't be disturbed, and remember to provide them with their food, water, litter trays and any familiar toys so they have everything they need in their safe space.

This beautiful girl has a varied appetite and on this particular occasion she decided to swallow 90cm of string! Our vet Ruth decided to make her sick and fortunately she successfully vomited up all the string.

Although it would seem that linear foreign bodies should pass uneventfully, this is not always the case. The string can become wrapped around the base of the tongue or the stomach which can be a choking hazard, cause the cat to swallow the string, or if the string had a needle attached the needle may pierce the stomach or intestines and more. If the string is wrapped around the internal organs, the intestines will attempt to move this linear foreign body down the gastrointestinal tract for elimination but

is unable to move.

this will result in the intestines bunching up and narrowing. This is an emergency and can lead to painful swelling in the cats stomach and the cat will be unable to eat until the item is removed. If the linear foreign body does not cause immediate blockage, it can also



harm your cat by causing perforation of your cats' internal organs. Think of a string rubbing these organs, this may cause the organs to perforate and puncture which

will prevent the organs from working appropriately and lead to internal bleeding, another emergency.

As you can she she is totally unphased by the whole thing and really cannot understand what all the fuss is about!
