HOT TOPICS

Arthritis affects most of our senior companions and is unfortunately a non-curable and progressive disease. The aches and pains are often worse when the weather is colder. Subtle changes to your pet's routine can be your pet's way of telling you that something is wrong.

*Reluctance to go for a walk or walking shorter distances.

*Stiffness when getting up after resting.

*Less inclined to climb stairs or jump on or off the sofa.

WINTER HEALTH TIPS

With the temperatures dropping around this time of year, it's not only us that need to be careful out there — we need to watch out for our pets too!

Watch your step!

As it drops below freezing, black ice provides a serious slip hazard for both you and your pets. So watch your step when you're out and about!

Achy joints?

Many of us can relate that the old arthritic joints start seizing up as soon as the temperature drops. So make sure to keep your old pets active for short periods throughout the day—although it's nice to lay in a warm bed all day, it only makes them stiffer.

Grit or not to Grit...

When the ground becomes icy we go straight to the rock salt to solve our problems, but we're creating an even bigger problem for our pets. Walking on gritted paths/roads can irritate your pet's paws, and when ingested through grooming, large amounts can be very dangerous or even deadly. So ensure to clean your pet's feet after walks or invest in booties to protect their little paws!

Antifreeze

Think before grabbing your handy antifreeze spray to defrost your car if you've got cats! Antifreeze is extremely toxic to cats and will often be ingested through grooming after venturing outside, walking through puddles left by our defrosting cars. Signs can start to show as little as 30 minutes after ingestion, to include vomiting and a 'drunk-like' state. Contact us immediately if you are concerned.



NEW YEAR... NEW ME

If your pet is struggling to lose those extra pounds after Christmas (we've all been there) our nursing team can help and support you with a tailored diet plan for your pet. They can customise the plan to suit your pet's needs, and offer free weight checks every 2-4 weeks to keep you accountable. You are not alone, some of us haven't even shifted those few extra pounds gained in lockdown...

Being an ideal weight is super important for your pet's health, providing benefits such as better mobility, less likely to need long term medications, less vet visits—a happier pet! The health risks are very concerning, such as diabetes, early onset arthritis, hypothyroidism, heart conditions and exercise intolerance.
